The Cistercian monastery in rural tranquility is on the World Heritage List due to its unique preserved condition. In 2018, it celebrated 25 years as a UNESCO site. The Ludwigsburg palaces and their museums, the unique gardens of Schwetzingen, the Mannheim Baroque Palace, Salem Monastery and Palace near Lake Constance, Weikersheim Palace in Hohenlohe and its famous Baroque garden, the State Palaces and Gardens is responsible for 60 of the most beautiful places in the region. The radiant Baroque monasteries of Upper Swabia, such as Wiblingen, Schussenried or Ochsenhausen, impressive Medieval sites, like the Bebenhausen and Alpirsbach monasteries, grandiose castles and fortress ruins, such as the Hohentwiel or the Hochburg Castle: Anyone wanting to experience Baden-Wuerttemberg has hit the jackpot with the State Palaces and Gardens of Baden-Wuerttemberg.
